KTC Child Health Multi-Disciplinary Assessment Team was developed to provide timely assessment services for children within Kee Tas Kee Now member nations. We serve Woodland Cree First Nation, Lubicon Lake Band, Loon River First Nation, Whitefish Lake First Nation, Peerless Trout First Nation and other child referrals for children through Jordan's Principal in Northern Alberta. Our team assesses children and youth ages 8 to 16 focusing on FASD and ASD primarily. Assessments are completed in the child's community, often avoiding long and stressful travel away from their home. Our community-based assessment provides substantive equality for nation children and their families. We use a multidisciplinary approach focused on cultural connectedness and the impact trauma has on child development.





Rajani FASD Assessment & Diagnostic Clinic Training Services, with support from the Government of Alberta has a revised resource for you! Thank you to Colleen Burns for revising the resource, and the professionals who provided feedback to support the development of this guide. The Competency Framework will be released in April and will be emailed to all Alberta Clinic Coordinators. We hope you find the competency framework guide, and the 20 updated competencies to be a practical, useful resource for your clinics.

A Competency Framework for FASD Assessment and Diagnostic Clinics is an updated resource from the 2018 Best Practices Guide. An excerpt from the Guide: "The intent of this guide is to provide a framework from which diagnostic clinics can measure their strengths and weaknesses in attempt to provide the most effective diagnostic services and is based on a set of standards that are important for all clinics. Importantly, by developing a set of standardized "Best Practice" competencies, the end result will lead to increased consistency in diagnostic outcomes amongst clinics, and higher quality services to clients. This guide is not intended to say what clinics must do in a given set of circumstances; rather, it is intended to offer a broad guide to the scope of services that FASD diagnostic clinics may provide and the professional manner in which this can be delivered. Competencies are not written for every Standard of Practice.

An additional goal of this guide is to emphasize the importance of adopting the same set of diagnostic recommendations as described in the revised FASD diagnostic guideline. In this way, clinic staff can be assured they are using consistent approaches and criteria for FASD diagnoses and collecting accurate data."

FASD Cross-Ministry Committee Council: Assessment & Diagnostic Council

In this section, we'd like to provide an overview of the Alberta FASD Cross-Ministry Committee Advisory Council: FASD Assessment and Diagnostic Council, as it is resuming this year.

The FASD Assessment & Diagnostic Council (Ax & Dx Council) began in 2014. It is an advisory council that seeks to provide improved accessibility for clinics, to facilitate connections and knowledge on research-based evidence to be translated into practice. The Ax & Dx Council works under the direction of the Council Terms of Reference.

Mission

Alberta FASD Assessment and Diagnosis Council will strive to assist Alberta FASD Clinics in achieving excellence and consistency in clinic practices by anticipating future opportunities and needs with clinicians, policy makers other stakeholders.

Purpose

The Council will enhance and encourage partnerships and provide opportunities for collaborations amongst stakeholders involved in FASD assessment and diagnosis.

Examples of activities of the Ax & Dx Council

- Identifying gaps related to FASD assessment and diagnostic services within the province.
- Identifying current needs and anticipate clinic needs.
- Participating in guidelines for assessment and diagnosis of FASD.
- Advocating that information from the assessment informs a support plan of recommendations across all systems for the individual with FASD and their caregivers, including a plan for transition to adult services.
- Inform government and other key stakeholders of the clinic needs and identify possible solutions.



New Research

CanFASD recently published their Top FASD Research Articles of 2021 <u>list</u>. Featuring research conducted across various areas of FASD, this list is intended to highlight a portion of the great work being conducted in this field.

Upcoming Webinars and Courses

CanFASD is currently planning a webinar for the month of May on providing culturally safe and responsive health services, with a focus on diagnosis. Follow CanFASD social media and newsletters for an announcement on the webinar date and registration details.

CanFASD is currently working on updated and publishing new online learning courses. Stay tuned for announcements on an updated Prevention Conversation Course this spring as well as two new course offerings: FASD for Community and Social Services Professionals and Substance Use Treatment Professionals and FASD.

National FASD Database

The <u>National FASD Database (DataForm</u>) is a Canadian depository of patientlevel data from individuals assessed for FASD across Canada. With nearly 30 Canadian FASD assessment and diagnostic clinics contributing data, the database has nearly 4,000 records and is considered one of the most comprehensive FASD databases in the world. Data included in the DataForm reflects the diagnostic profile of individuals with prenatal alcohol exposure and the spectrum of health and social issues they are experiencing. Importantly, the DataForm provides a Canadian database from which research questions can be answered and used to inform best practices and policies that address gaps in service delivery and ultimately improve outcomes for people with FASD. The National FASD Database has resulted in multiple academic publications that have advanced the field of FASD research. Topics that have been published on include experiences of children in <u>child welfare</u>, the importance and impact of <u>affect regulation</u>, the prevalence and correlates of <u>suicidality</u>, and increased understanding of <u>difficulties of daily living</u> that individuals with FASD experience across the lifespan. As the database continues to grow, researchers can begin to ask and answer more complex questions about the experiences of individuals with FASD that will inform both practice and policy.
